Dear Friends

I cannot believe this is my last letter to you as your Diocesan President; where has that 6 years gone. It has been an amazing 6 years; times of anguish, times when I really have not felt in my comfort zone but in the main a time of friendship, love and prayer with members throughout the Diocese and beyond working together to make a difference for vulnerable people worldwide. I am so glad that I said yes 6 years ago and stepped up to be the Diocesan President of MU here in the London Diocese and thank Mary Sumner for starting Mothers' Union 142 years ago. Mothers' Union is as relevant today as it was then as the call to support families here and globally is now even greater.

This is a time of change within MU worldwide. A year of change with the governance of the MU; a new Constitution with regulations that can easily be changed when necessary that are both in tune with the 20th Century and reflecting the global membership.

The membership is even more highlighted in the recent elections for the next triennial when it was announced that MU has made history in electing its first ever Worldwide President from outside the British Isles. Our new Worldwide President, Mrs Sheran Harper is from Guyana, part of the Anglican Church in the Province of the West Indies and has made history as the first non-British Worldwide President of MU. Sheran will represent and lead the 4 million members in 84 countries

From the beginning of 2019, Sheran will lead the newly elected Central Trustee Board made up of 11 trustees – five from the provinces within Britain & Ireland including Nikki Sweatman for our Canterbury Province and six from the rest of the world which will truly represent our worldwide organisation; an organisation that in 2017 made a difference in the lives of over three quarters of a million people worldwide with 100,000 of them in Britain and Ireland.

Like MU worldwide we must also change with the times. With the elections we have new members on the Trustee Board, Initiatives running their course like CAMEO for retired clergy widows which is no longer viable, meetings in the 4 Areas thereby reaching more members. Our members change and we must adapt and not get despondent when regular monthly branch meetings are not well supported; stand back and look at the branch membership and ask what would be best for MU here in this parish..

I am very pleased and happy that at the end of the year I will pass the baton into the capable hands of Sue Johnson who I know will be a wonderful inspiring leader and I know members will give Sue the love and support I have had and we will all together continue to **Follow in Mary Sumner's Footsteps.**

All Saints Day

For some reason, people who don't practise the Christian faith but are happy to examine it intellectually very rarely have much of an idea of what it's like to be a Christian. So for many people Christianity is about life after death, with its central message being of some distant future that can comfort us in our adversities. Well, of course at the heart of what we believe is resurrection faith, and the hope of overcoming death, but primarily Christianity is about Christ, and about all life, earthly and heavenly. About now, as well as then.

When we celebrate All Saints Day we can be tempted to think of a distant, celestial paradise, the vision glorious of a far off place where the very holy people dwell. Wherever it is, it seems beyond our reach. But what would be the point of simply showing us a pretty picture and then closing the book? Surely as we celebrate the feast of All Saints the Church shows us a picture, and then she tells us something more.

The word 'saint' in the New testament could just as correctly be translated 'holy one', and its used especially by Paul to mean all believers. A saint, a holy one, was a Christian, like you and me. You're probably sick of being told the word holy means 'set apart'. Different if you like. Set apart for God.

So those whose lives we are celebrating are not remote, angelic, sinless figures that we can sometimes imagine them to be. The saints were ordinary people who lived extraordinary lives. And when we think of them as being sinless, doing no wrong, then in fact we're being blasphemous –for Christ alone is the sinless one.

It's not just what someone was like which makes them a saint, and neither is it merely the record of their deeds on earth. Saints are saints not because of who they are, but because of what God made them, what God did with those ordinary lives to make them extraordinary. Sainthood is not an achievement, it's a gift from God, the gift by which he takes each one of us and sets us apart, calls us to holiness, to be used for his purposes.

We might say that what makes someone a saint is not the fact that they never sin, but rather the opposite. It's the fact that they know all too well that they sin, but they also know that the love of Christ swallows up their sins and weakness. They are set apart because they have found in Christ the remedy for sin, and they have been faithful to him in struggling against it.

Now you will say to me, but that's just the point. We're not like saints because we're not heroic, we don't give up our lives, we won't be persecuted. Maybe. But perhaps there are occasions for all of us to stand up to be counted which won't necessarily mean being a martyr, except in the literal sense of the word, which is a witness. Being a saint means telling the world about Christ, and we can all do that in the choices we make, in our service of God and neighbour and in lives hollowed out by praise and thanksgiving.

Saints aren't remembered because they did bad things. As it happens they did, but we honour them because they stood up to be counted for Christ, because they knew above everything else that the weakness and cruelty to which human beings so often succumb have met their match in Christ, and have disappeared like rain drops in the ocean of God's love. Ordinary like us, they allowed themselves to become extraordinary through God's possession of them.

Just the same thing happens to us every time we approach the altar. God calls us to meet him in the sacrament, sets us apart by swallowing our sins and increasing our faith. He draws us, compels us even to share his table to eat his food and so share in the worship of heaven. The saints whom we honour sit down with us at God's table, they are among us every time we gather together to celebrate the Eucharist. And they are among us as the normal and everyday people that they were, praying constantly that we will do as they did, and follow the God who calls the ordinary to become extraordinary.

On Tuesday 16th October the team of Mothers' Union 3C's (Coffee, Cake and Chat) volunteers met together at Great Ormond Street Hospital for an afternoon of training, getting to know each other and worship.

We were led by the chaplains Jim, Dorothy and Anne Marie. Our first session focussed on Listening Skills and was facilitated by Jamie who works at GOSH. We worked in groups to explore how to become better listeners. After this Jim and Anne Marie enabled us to reflect on the importance of confidentiality and safeguarding using scenarios which were very relevant to the work we do at GOSH. Our discussions were lively and interesting. As a group we were reminded of the importance of these aspects of our work there and will help us to be consistent.

After refreshments we had a short Mass during which the Aumbry for the chapel was blessed and dedicated. Rachel Nugee, a past Central President and London Diocese President of the MU had left a legacy in her Will to the MU in the London Diocese and it was decided to use some of the money to purchase an Aumbry, a recess in a church in which sacred vessels are kept, for St. Christopher's Chapel in the hospital when we discovered that the hospital did not have the facility to hold the blessed sacrament in the hospital and up to now have obtained the consecrated elements from the Royal

London when they needed to give communion to one of their patients or parents. The Aumbry can be used by both the Anglican and Roman Catholic Church.

We had a lovely afternoon of learning and getting to know each other socially. Enormous thanks to the Chaplains for making the afternoon so successful and enjoyable.

Comfort lives at Lambeth Palace with her husband Josiah Atkins Idowu-Fearon a Nigerian Anglican Bishop who is the Secretary General of the Anglican Consultative Council.

Comfort asked us to consider the question what would Mary Sumner think of the MU now and we looked at the new incentive of MULOA – Mothers' Union Looks, Observes and Acts which is giving us that fresh start to look at what we do and what is needed now in our world. Mary all those years ago was afraid but it did not stop her doing what God wanted her to do. Mary did not walk on water but it must have felt like it. Like her we have to trust in God.

We reflected on Jesus Walking on Water (Matthew 14: v 22 - 33) and Psalm 23, two very



well known passages in the Bible and it was good to read and study them in the quiet of the Crypt in Lambeth Palace.

Our time together culminated in a Eucharist with the staff of Lambeth Palace and we then wandered into the grounds and had lunch together before going back into the hectic world of

London to make our way home.

Prayer and Praise Day, 18th October 2018

Our Prayer and Praise Day started with "The Streets of London" as sang by Roger Whitaker in the 1970s. The wordings detailed the plight of the needy on London streets. The same issue

was embodied in the theme for the day: "A Foggy Day in London".

The programme began with Pat Beazley unveiling the interactive activities beginning with a brief video of all the ills and vices happening in London today. Everyone was asked to write out the issues of concern on London streets, as identified by their own Churches, on triangular pieces of coloured paper which were hung on a line across the room; followed by animated conversation and brainstorming on the numerous



methods initiated and adopted to tackle the problems as identified by each Church. We wrote prayers identifying the problems for use during Intercessory Prayers followed by our mid-day Wave of Prayer and a sing-song accompanied by Carolyn Bryant a lady with an infectious smile playing the Guitar.

After lunch we started with activities for physical wellbeing in the form of "aerobics cum pilates cum zumba". It was an exhilarating session of both spiritual and physical rejuvenation We were joined by Fr. Graham Buckle from Rochester Row to lead our Eucharist. His magnetic personality charged up the whole room as he gave the Homily and led the Intercessory Prayers. Fr. Graham took our written 'Prayers for London' back to his own church in Rochester Row. There was an outpouring of love and goodwill amongst the 27+ who attended. Thank you Pat for an amazing "Prayer and Praise Day". We were truly blessed a real day of worship, rejoicing and praise to the Glory of God. Amen.
