### **Emergency Relief**

Mothers' Union has over 72,000 members in Europe, predominantly in Britain and Ireland, but including small branches within Europe of members who were themselves asylum seekers who fled conflict. Every year Mothers' Union across the world, most recently in developing countries, brings "emergency relief" to around 25,000 people through the provision of food, basic household provisions of blankets and sleeping bags, cooking utensils, water sanitation kits and soap.

*Lord, we want to hear your voice, guide us as we, as Mothers' Union, reach out in your name to refugees both in Europe and the Middle East and those affected by conflict in South Sudan and Burundi, in Thailand and many other areas across the world. Bless the work of Mothers' Union and lead us, Lord, to fully play our part. Amen*

**London Diocese Mothers' Union Retreat  
25-27 September 2015 at  
The Anglican Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham**

If you think the Anglican Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham is only for those with an affinity with High Anglican tradition, it is time to think again!

I set out for this year's London Diocese Mothers' Union Retreat with reservations believing that it was for the catholic tradition. However, my experience over the weekend dispelled all my disquiets.

Walsingham presented a safe place to reflect and pray.

We started each day with communal breakfast at 8am. This was followed by meditations given by The Rev'd. Richard Knowling who led us on the retreat. His talks framed my mindset for all the activities and services over the weekend.

Through the rhythm of each day's prayers, address, and space for reflection, I gained deeper insight into the centrality of Mary to a life of faith and prayerfulness. Facing her icons, I found, leads one into prayers, into grappling with the significance of Mary's exemplary self-giving.

Besides, her unreserved outpouring of herself for God was demonstrated most powerfully at the service of Sprinkling of Water. In it, we were reminded of the impossible task of holding onto water in our palms. The preacher had explained that in that same manner, Christ calls us to go and serve him in others.

This was a timely reminder in this season of thanksgiving (for the bounty of harvest, the gift of life, the joy of those with whom we share our life and the memory of those we see no more). Whatever we are blessed with is not ours to hold onto but to use to bless others and that is when we are truly disciples of Jesus Christ.

We departed Walsingham, inspired by the profound words of Fr. Richard and final charge that as we travel with Christ, we must learn, especially in the depths of despair, to Let Go and Let GOD.

The whole experience was comforting and inspiring. It was a blessed weekend.

## General Meeting 2015

I look forward to the General Meeting each year as it's an opportunity to meet together with fellow members and celebrate our achievements. Two welcome services were arranged for the Friday evening; one at Southwell Minster (I want to return so I can see their fantastic stations of the cross) and the other at St Mary's in the Lace Market. I attended the latter. It was a packed church and the address given by Rt Rev. Tony Porter, Bishop of Sherwood. He spoke about "give us this day our daily bread" and what it means to us in 2015. The Lord's Prayer is Jesus teaching us how to pray. In this bit of the prayer He teaches:

God cares for our bodies: Needs not Greeds; Sharing our finances and our time.

The walk from our hotel to the Royal Concert Hall was proof of how hilly Nottingham is but a vibrant city. I would have loved to have followed the Floral Trail. These were different sculpted items. I did manage a shoe, a jacket, handbag, cup cake. Over 1600 members gathered together to join in opening worship led by our Central Chaplain, Bishop Andrew Proud. Our Worldwide President then took the stage and told us of her travels over the past year, recounting stories of transformational work that members are achieving around the world. The first speakers were Bill Crooks and Jackie Mouradian (Mosaic Creative) who demonstrated the Church and Community Mobilisation Process; how it works, the opportunities it gives and some examples of outcomes. Jackie used the story of when the woman touched Jesus' cloak. Lunchtime gave us the opportunity to catch up with friends and purchase items which the local members had provided.

The afternoon started off with Jane Groves and Nicola Lawrence from Action and Outreach updating on some inspiring and exciting developments throughout the Mothers' Union membership. Our keynote speaker, Jane Fearnley-Whittingshall's talk was entitled from Generation to Generation; I had hoped it would show us how life in the past has had influence on the future but it was more a trip down memory lane.

Reg Bailey then stood up to deliver his final address as Chief Executive. He spoke of his time with Mothers' Union and how he has been inspired over the years by amazing members. True to form he performed some magic tricks. After a standing ovation for him we sang and prayed together in closing worship led by Bishop Tony Porter.

The General Meeting is a wonderful opportunity to find out more about the work of the Mothers' Union; it's vision for the future and a chance to get together with members from all over the world. The Annual Review, which each delegate was given, provides a first rate account of the work of the organisation worldwide.

Next year we celebrate the 140th anniversary of Mothers' Union and we return to where it all began, in Winchester. The theme is "Celebration of Faith" Hope many of you will be able to attend.

Ann shared her insights into ageing, such as perceptions, relationships, lifestyle, and the importance of structure, in a very entertaining way. She made us laugh as well as ponder. There was time for discussion in small groups.



Two points in particular struck me: that loving and working are the twin pillars of mental health; and that the desire to have someone to please is very strong (clergy, please note!)

As well as the content of the presentation, I was impressed by the range of people who chose to come: from a local retirement housing scheme as well as two other MU branches, other (non-Anglican) churches, our Singing Group, and some I didn't previously know.

I should like to thank our Vicar, Fr Edward Dowler, and Margaret Blazey, for opening and closing the meeting and for their help in the planning.

# In Memory

## Rachel Nugee 1928-2015

Wherever you were in the world at a Mothers' Union meeting if Rachel's name came up everyone knew who she was and had a story to tell. She was so much of the Worldwide Mothers' Union having been Diocesan President of London and Central President as it was then called— now Worldwide President.

My sister an MU Diocesan President in Australia introduced me to Rachel and she often spoke of her visit to Australia and the Islands of the Pacific. Most of her overseas trips were memorable not only because of her brilliant speaking but because she would not accept that racial divisions in any country were acceptable to the Mothers' Union. When she entered a church in South Africa where she was to speak and found only the white members were allowed into the Church she tried to reason with the police but to no avail so she lead the white members out onto the forecourt where the service was held. Her actions did even more for those members than her excellent preaching.

Rachel had a brilliant brain and was responsible for preparing much of the London Constitution. She was a very active member in the Diocese of London, working on several committees including A&O. I was at a DP Conference when my husband was ill so I kept my phone on in case I was needed. The phone rang and I went outside to answer it when I came back there was silence so I said "It was Rachel Nugee wanting to know what I wanted on the Agenda for the A&O meeting" everyone burst into laughter. We had been discussing a very complicated issue so when Rachel apologised for disturbing the meeting I said "you were a little light relief" to which she replied "I have never been thought of as a light relief". Rachel never missed a Diocesan Festival Service in St.Paul's Cathedral. She was always there with her devoted husband Edward. Sadly she was unable to be with us in 2015 as her darling Ted had died at the end of 2014.

Rachel's faith was so strong, I think, because like the first disciples she had been brought up in the Jewish faith and accepted Christ as the Messiah. At her funeral she asked to have "Adon Olan" sung in Hebrew. It ends "into his hands I commit my spirit when I sleep and I awake; and with my spirit my body. The Lord is with me, I will not fear." May she Rest in Peace and Rise in Glory.


