The Patron's Lunch was part of the celebrations recognising the Queen's patronage of over 600 Charities and Organisations including Mothers' Union, on the occasion of her 90th Birthday and 22 Members of Mothers' Union were selected by ballot to represent the Dioceses at the Lunch on Sunday, 12th June, 2016 and Gogo-Rose Ilo represented London Diocese.

Rachael Arding of Mary Sumner House coordinated all the representatives drawn from different Dioceses such as Canterbury, London, Manchester, Chichester, Guildford, Connor, Southwark, Gloucester and Bristol and e-mail conversations before the day meant that we all met on the day as friends. We were also joined by The Worldwide President, Lynne Tembey and the Chief Executive of Mothers' Union, Beverley Jullien.



WALKING THE LAST MILE WITH RITA PENGELLY: 140km Walk to Commemorate 140th Anniversary of Mothers' Union

It was certainly quite an experience!

On Monday 12th September 2016 from 10.30 am members began to assemble near the Tibetan Peace Garden at the Imperial War Museum to await the arrival of Rita from Canterbury Diocese. 18 members then accompanied her on the last mile of her 140km Walk to raise £1,400 for Mothers' Union.

All dressed in our MU T-shirts we walked along Lambeth Road passing Lambeth Palace and making our way to Mary Sumner House with Rita accompanied by her husband, Simon leading the way.

As we entered Tufton Street people waved and clapped as she approached Mary Sumner House. Beverley Jullien, Chief Executive of the Mothers' Union and other staff stood at the entrance holding a Blue Ribbon Sash for Rita and her husband to walk through and into the MSH building amidst thunderous applause from the crowd and everyone congratulating Rita for a successful 140km Walk.

Midday Prayers were then observed in the MU Chapel before a reception was held in the Princess Alexandra Room

BOW GROUP, STEPNEY AREA - PRAYER WALK

On Saturday, 14 May 2016, a small but determined group from St. Paul's Old Ford MU Branch set off at 9:30am at St. Mary's Bow to pray and then met about 20 Christian Aid walkers at St. Paul's Old Ford for prayer; then we walked up the road and prayed at various places on the way to St. Barnabas, We then took a bus ride to St. John's Bethnal Green, and prayed and then walked and stopped to pray along the way. We met those on a PCC Away Day for mass at St. Matthew's Bethnal Green warmly greeted by their clergy and wardens, then on to Christ Church Spitalfields for prayer (they had an away day as well) and ate a late lunch at their cafe. All in conjunction with the Archbishop's call to prayer for 24 May, "Thy Kingdom Come".

It was amazing how much thanks we prayed as we passed two markets, fire stations, police stations, nursing home, war memorials and just the freedom to pray outside without fear of persecution or harm. As we prayed for the needs of the city housing we saw homeless people begging, those addicted to alcohol, drugs, and gambling and shopping! But it was a great day to join with the churches across the UK in prayer. We look forward to the next walk.

HOLLOWAY PRISON

When Florrie Curtis came up with the idea of delivering "Home and Family" (the predecessor to "Families First") to Holloway Prison no one would have thought it possible that from 1992 until very recently MU in London Diocese would be running a "Babes in Prison" project in Holloway. This connected with the work of Beatrice Burgess, a former inspector of Schools and the Prison Chaplain's wife who had a charity Babes in Prison that is still active today in prisons up and down the country.



Our Social Concern Committee thought
Mothers' Union had something to offer the mothers and babies who were aged between 0-9
months old. The word somehow reached Melbourne Diocese via a visiting Australian to London
who took the idea back to Australia. And very soon we got a message back that they were
praying for us; that was the strength we needed as this sort of task, to our knowledge, had not
been done anywhere before!! We were often asked why we wanted to do this pastoral work in a
Prison and the answer was easy "because the babies are innocent"

After many talks around the Diocese it wasn't long before we had MU members knitting multi-coloured baby jackets and floor mats as we had identified a need for these on the unit where the mothers and babies were as they lacked the stimulation they needed of colour. The knitting went beyond London and we were soon sewing in a label "With love from the Mother's Union".

Then two things happened quite beyond our hope -

Baby walkers were requested to take out the babies as these babies had no experience of the outside world; the buses, the people rushing by their buggies, rain or wind. It was a special type of person who was needed for this as they had to gently encourage the mum to give her most precious baby over to a stranger who would take her baby outside. On returning the baby walker would tell the mum all that had happened while they were out. This time without her child did allow the prisoner to do any vital business that she couldn't do with her child. These special MU members came forward willingly and once vetted by the prison an eager team wouldn't miss their place on the rota. Many of those original Baby Walkers are no longer with us but in God's nearer Presence but any gaps were always filled. One early baby walker was eventually asked to be 'Grandma' when she could no longer take the babies out due to her advancing years, but she was so good with the mothers and babies she stayed in with those who couldn't go out that day, her name. Lydia Bradshaw – Jane Davidson's Mum.

The 2nd amazing thing that happened was the prisoners who met in the Prison Chapel wanted to belong to the Mother's Union 'Wow'. The Bishop of Stepney (now the Bishop of London) led the first enrolment service and I will never forget when he called each new member "dearly beloved": the hairs still tingle on the back of my neck.

Lastly, I was asked by Mollie Nichols if I would make a Banner for the MU Branch using the design of the wall hanging behind the Altar in the Chapel; this banner has been paraded ever since at our Festival Service in St. Paul's Cathedral.

This work grew to cover MU members helping at visitor centres and other places of work in over 70 prisons and I believe my memory is correct in saying worldwide. Our work is done at Holloway, which has now closed, we were greatly Blessed and it is unknown the lives we touched.

Retreat at Bishop Woodford House, Ely

I am delighted to have been asked by our Diocesan President Margaret to write about our Retreat which took place in September.

Members from the London Diocese were warmly welcomed with refreshments and home baked cakes and we were introduced to Fr. Edward Dowler who led us in our Retreat which started in the beautiful Ely Cathedral where we joined the choir in melodious Evensong.

On our return to Bishop Woodford House, we were served delicious supper and then enjoyed



our first address from Fr Edward. The Retreat was based on extracts from a book entitled "Faith and Struggle on Smokey Mountain" by Fr. Benigno P Beltran (Orbis Book, 2012) which was based on his observation and interaction with a poor community in the Philippines who sourced their livelihood and lived around the garbage dump and he called it Smokey Mountain because of the smoke that came out of the burning garbage. He described how he celebrated Eucharist with the people in that environment surrounded by flies and cockroaches and others scavenging in the garbage dump. It shows that God is everywhere. God is present with His people even in the rotten garbage of Smokey Mountain just as He is with the people celebrating Mass in Magnificent Cathedrals.

After breakfast on the Saturday Fr.Edward gave an address centred on the environment and ministry on Smokey Mountain where Fr. Benigno saw a great deal of wastage and he was shocked to see how these people who live there make use and earn a living from what other people have thrown away; plastics, empty bottles, discarded household goods; they do the recycling. The wealthy provide the most waste but the poor suffer the consequences. If waste recycling is properly done our planet will be a safer place instead of scavengers exposing themselves to health risks mainly due to the toxins as they try to survive on rubbish dumps. One may wonder if God exists, and allows this to happen. The more Fr. Benigno looked at them, the more he was convinced that he needed to be there with them and he eventually decided to live among them. Seeing the scavengers die so easily reminded him of the fragility of his own life; the scavengers were human beings like him. He wanted his theology to make a difference in their lives.

After a coffee break Fr. Edward continued by talking about the women and children on Smokey Mountain who were completely powerless to do anything about their environment but he was intrigued by their ingenuity and hard working. The couples on Smokey Mountain tended to have large families because they believed that due to the malnutrition and suffering and pre-mature death, if they had more children, at least some would survive to look after them when they were old. Children were encouraged to scavenge to augment the family income! Domestic violence was common as the men resorted to drunkenness.

The morning ended with a Eucharist and after lunch we had free time to explore Ely, its impressive Cathedral and historic town. In the evening we joined the Choral Evensong and Installation of Rev Dr. Jessica Martin as Canon Residentiary of Ely and on Sunday morning we returned to the Cathedral to celebrate the Sung Eucharist where she preached the sermon.

The Retreat was a great time of reflection, highly inspirational and thoroughly enjoyed by all those who participated. Our sincere thanks go to Sue Johnson who organised it, Fr. Edward who officiated at the Retreat and the staff of Bishop Woodford House Ely.

FESTIVAL SERVICE, 14TH JUNE 2016.

Our yearly Festival Service was held at the magnificent St Paul's Cathedral on Tuesday, 14th June 2016. It was a well attended event with members from all Areas within the Diocese of London and invited guests from other Dioceses and Churches. The theme for the year was 'Celebration of Faith' and the Service was designed to mark the 140 years anniversary of Mothers' Union founded by

Mary Sumner in 1876, and the Commissioning of the Trustees Board.

The Bishop of London's wife, Caroline Chartres, gave the Address which centred on this year's theme; she spoke on the many aspects of the Mothers Union since its inception as a meeting of local mothers of all social classes offering mutual support to each other to championing good causes to promote, strengthen and support marriage and family life worldwide.

The Festival Service 2016 will be remembered as the year MU London Diocese initiated for the first time the Commissioning of the Trustee Board. The Ceremony was conducted by the Archdeacon, Venerable Rosemary Lain-Priestley on behalf of the Bishop of London. It was a solemn moment as, one by one, the Diocesan President, Margaret Blazey presented the Trustees for the Oath of Office. Each candidate received a Certificate to mark the occasion to the thunderous applause from the congregation.

The Director of Music, Neil Hawes from St. Mary's, Osterley led the Festival Service Choir made up of MU members and choir members from other churches in the London Diocese while the musical interlude was provided by the Gospel Choir from Bishop Stopford School in Enfield.

At the end of the Service was the well choreographed pageant of the Flag-bearers from about 40 churches, as they processed down the aisle, with their distinctive banners raised high led by

Jonathan White carrying the MU London Diocese banner.

We thank the Cathedral Team for their usual and ever cordial cooperation, and impeccable arrangements that once again made our Festival Service an occasion for worship and celebration.

I was very pleased to be able to attend the commissioning of our two new Area Vice Presidents - Catherine Dyett and Sally Goulden.




