Commissioning of President and Trustees

The President and Trustees stand before the Bishop, who says

We have come together here to worship God and to commission the elected members to the office of President and Trustee in Mothers' Union. This is a joyful and important occasion. Each office carries great responsibility, for Mothers' Union is a worldwide society within the church, with special concern for all that strengthens and preserves marriage and family life.

The Bishop asks the President

The office of Diocesan President of Mothers' Union is a solemn trust carrying great responsibility. Are you willing to commit yourself to this office and work?

The President responds, saying

With the help of God, I am.

The Bishop asks the Trustees

Trustees in the Diocese of London do you accept office in Mothers' Union?

The Trustees respond, saying

I do, the Lord being my helper.

The Bishop asks the President and the Trustees

Will you serve God in this way, in the firm belief that the power of the Holy Spirit will guide and direct all who call upon him?

They respond, saying

I will, putting my trust in him.

The Bishop takes the President by the right hand, and says

Sue, I admit you to the office of Diocesan President in this our Diocese of London in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The President presents the Trustees to the Bishop, who takes them by the right hand, and says

N. I admit you to the office of Trustee in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, Amen.

Members of Mothers' Union stand, and the Bishop says

Members of Mothers' Union in the Diocese of London, will you remember your President and your Trustees in your prayers and give them your loyal support and encouragement?

Members of Mothers' Union in the Diocese of London respond, saying

We will.

The Bishop prays

O God, we ask that you will bless your servants with a sense of your presence, and knowledge of your constant love. Give wisdom and understanding, your guidance and the humility to accept it. Grant all members the grace to support and uphold all who work in your name; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

The Trustees return to their seats. Members of Mothers' Union remain standing.

Act of Affirmation and Enrolment of a new member

The Reverend Karen Wellman stands before the Bishop.

The President says

The mission of Mothers' Union is to show our Christian faith by the transformation of communities worldwide, through the promotion of stable marriage, family life and the protection of children. We aim to achieve this through carrying out our objectives: to encourage parents in their role to develop the faith of their children; to maintain a worldwide fellowship of Christians united in prayer, worship and service; to promote conditions in society favourable to stable family life and the protection of children; to help those whose family life has met with adversity; and to promote and support married life.

The Bishop says

Membership of the worldwide Mothers' Union is open to all who have been baptised in the name of the Holy Trinity and who support the mission and objectives of Mothers' Union. I ask both new and present members to join in affirming their commitment to Mothers' Union. Do you reaffirm your baptism promises?

They respond, saying

I do, with God's help.

The Bishop asks

Will you continue to nurture your personal relationship with God and be committed to his family, the Church?

They respond, saying

I will, by the grace of God.

The Bishop admits the new member, saying

Karen, I admit you to membership of Mothers' Union, in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The Bishop greets the new member and presents her Membership Card.

The Bishop says

Let us commit to God the life of our Diocese.

as members of this Diocese we commit its life to you;
we seek your blessing in all we do:
your presence in our fellowship
your inspiration in our activities;
your strength in our service to the Church
and to the community;
help us to be faithful in prayer and worship
and outgoing in our witness to the gospel,

and glorify your name,
through Jesus Christ our Lord.

The Eucharistic Prayer

The Bishop says

Lift up your hearts.


We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

Father, we give you thanks and praise through your beloved Son Jesus Christ, your living Word, through whom you have created all things; who was sent by you in your great goodness to be our Saviour.

By the power of the Holy Spirit he took flesh; as your Son, born of the blessed Virgin, he lived on earth and went about among us; he opened wide his arms for us on the cross; he put an end to death by dying for us; and revealed the resurrection by rising to new life; so he fulfilled your will and won for you a holy people.

Therefore with angels and archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we proclaim your great and glorious name, for ever praising you and singing:



Holy, Holy! Lord God Almighty! Heaven and earth shall sing thy praise and glory give to thee; Holy, Holy! Merciful and Mighty! God in Three Persons, blessed Trinity!

Lord, you are holy indeed, the source of all holiness; grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit, and according to your holy will, these gifts of bread and wine may be to us the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ;

who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying:

Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying:

Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me. A Deacon says

Great is the mystery of faith.

Christ has died:

Christ is risen:

Christ will come again.

And so, Father, calling to mind his death on the cross, his perfect sacrifice made once for the sins of the whole world; rejoicing in his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and looking for his coming in glory, we celebrate this memorial of our redemption. As we offer you this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, we bring before you this bread and this cup and we thank you for counting us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you.

Send the Holy Spirit on your people and gather into one in your kingdom all who share this one bread and one cup, so that we, in the company of all the saints, may praise and glorify you for ever, through Jesus Christ our Lord;

by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever.

Amen.

Silence is kept.

The Bishop says

Let us pray with confidence as our Saviour has taught us:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us.

And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever.

Breaking of the Bread

The Bishop breaks the consecrated bread, saying


We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.

Giving of Communion

The Bishop invites the people to receive Holy Communion, saying

God's holy gifts for God's holy people. Jesus Christ is holy, Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. Please sit, and then follow the directions of the Virgers and Wandsmen.



Please be aware of other people's desire to maintain social distancing when coming to receive communion. Though Holy Communion is offered in both kinds, everyone is free to receive in one kind only. If you do wish to receive in both kinds, please do not dip the Eucharistic wafers into the wine.

All baptized Christians who receive communion in their own churches are welcome to receive communion.

Those communicants requiring gluten-free wafers are asked to identify themselves to a Virger or Wandsman and to receive communion from the President.

Any member of the congregation may come to receive a blessing; if you come forward for a blessing, please keep your head bowed.
